# **Highlights**

#### **Research News:**

6-9/07: **28th Annual Meeting of the Association for the Scientific Study of Consciousness (ASSC)** — coorganized by the **University of Crete**, the **University of Cambridge**, and **Liège Université**.

Over 770 participants from Europe, America, and Australia gathered to discuss key issues surrounding consciousness through a rich interdisciplinary program.



10/07: Publication of the scientific article "Embracing Complexity and Uncertainties to Deal with Climate Change Challenges: An Interdisciplinary Module for Preservice Teacher Education" in the Science and Education Journal, featuring contributions from members of the Department. The study focuses on how future educators can be prepared to navigate uncertainty related to climate change.

10/07: Publication of the scientific article "Integration of Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) With Artificial Intelligence Tools Through an LMS in Education" in the edited volume "AI in Learning, Educational Leadership, and **Special Education: Innovations** and Ethical Dilemmas" (IGI Global). authored by PhD candidate Christina Smaropoulou and Assistant Professor Aikaterini Vasiou of our Department. The study presents an innovative pilot intervention in primary classrooms where Social and Emotional **Learning** (SEL) is integrated with **AI tools** through a learning management system (LMS).

30/07: Publication of Issue 2 (2025) of the **Journal of Educational Sciences**, featuring 11 scientific articles offering original research contributions across the broad field of Education Sciences.

25-29/08: Participation of the Science **Teaching**  $(E.\Delta.\Theta.E.)$ in the Conference of the European Science Education Research **Association (ESERA)**, held in Copenhagen, Denmark. The Laboratory's contribution included three poster presentations and oral presentations.



23-26/09: Participation of the Laboratory for the Study of Language and Literature in Education (Ε.ΜΕ.Γ.ΛΟ.) in the 17th International Conference on Greek Linguistics (ICGL17), held in Cambridge, UK.

The Laboratory contributed with **four oral presentations** and **co-organized a thematic session** as part of the conference program.

Academic Visit of Associate Professor Paraskevi Thomou to the University of Iceland:



The Associate Professor of our Department, Paraskevi Thomou, visited the School of Education at the University of Iceland, where she taught in a postgraduate program on linguistic and cultural awareness in multilingual classrooms, delivered a lecture at the School's research center on awareness in language learning and teaching, and met with academics within the framework of the Global Teacher Education (Erasmus+) program.

She also participated in the mid-term evaluation of a doctoral dissertation. This academically and scientifically enriching visit further strengthened the Department's international collaborations and the exchange of good educational practices.



#### The Erasmus+ Experience Through the Words of Our Students...

Vicky, Emmanouela, Violeta, and Electra — four students from our Department — share their experiences of studying abroad through the Erasmus+ program:



#### **Refore departure:**

**Vicky:** I've been waiting for this trip to Krakow for almost a year, since I made my statement. Just before I left, I felt excitement, anxiety, anguish, but mostly a huge impatience. But at the same time, I also felt a void, because I couldn't realize that I would finally live this experience.

**Emmanuela:** I was lucky and a vacancy opened just a few months before I was due to leave for the University of Bologna in Italy. Moving was something I had wanted to do for a long time, but I was both excited and nervous as it was a completely new place and experience for me.

Violeta: I was very excited because I knew I would have a unique experience in another country. I was looking forward to meeting new people, learning new things, new cultures and traveling as much as possible. But at the same time, I was also nervous because I would be far away from my family and loved ones.

Electra: Mv feelings were mixed. There was excitement this for new beginning, but at the same time there was a lot of anxiety, which of course soon goes away!



#### **<u>Marketine</u>** Mew house, new city:

**Vicky:** Life in Krakow was incredible. A large city, yet accessible, with excellent organization and infrastructure, which made a big impression on me compared to the Greek megacities. My accommodation was excellent but I found myself in the position of cohabiting for the first time, which was a challenge for me. Nevertheless, the overall experience surpassed any difficulty.

**Emmanuela:** The ultimate student life, a city full of international students and places. However, transportation and accommodation were very expensive, and you also need to be careful with scams when finding accommodation. Unfortunately, this happened to me from the first day, but I managed to cope with it and find accommodation thanks to the help of students! Life is quite affordable and students often go to student, hangouts all over the city.



**Violet:** Life in Brno seemed very beautiful to me. It is a city with many students, easy transportation, nice cafes and several parks and places to walk. I was very impressed by the architecture, which is quite different from Greece. As for my accommodation, I lived in student dormitories with one of my best friends, Electra, which made my stay much easier and more enjoyable. The only thing that made it quite difficult for me at the beginning was the intense cold, which reached -10 degrees.

**Electra:** Brno is a student city with students from all over the world. Life there is generally calm, but there are plenty of options for entertainment. As for the accommodation experience, it was something different. It was my first time living in a dormitory, but I adapted to it quite quickly. Of course, the fact that I was living with one of my best friends, Violeta, also helped, and made the whole accommodation experience easier and more fun.

#### The New University:

**Vicky:** "The courses were easy to follow yet rich in quality and substance. We attended classes in person, and instead of final exams, we had final projects — something that worked out really well. The professors were flexible and always willing to help us."

**Emmanouela:** "The courses were quite manageable, and the professors were cooperative, friendly, and had an excellent level of English. Oral examinations were very common. I do think, however, that a welcome day organized by the university would have been helpful — to get to know the city, the campus, and fellow students."

#### The Return:

**Vicky:** "For me, Erasmus was a collection of unforgettable experiences. I chose to travel quite a lot around Europe, which gave me incredible images and memories. Those five months were full of new acquaintances, new rhythms, and the feeling that you're living something truly unique — something you know won't last forever."

**Emmanouela:** "After this experience, I know I can rely on myself and handle any challenges that come with moving somewhere new. I feel more confident in my decisions and, more than ever, like a true citizen of the world."

**Violeta:** "The most important thing I gained from this experience was stepping out of my comfort zone. I learned how to manage situations, communicate with people from different backgrounds, and depend more on myself."

# Life Before and After Graduation – Alumni Stories: "Grigoris Swims Toward His Goals and Inspires"



## Before Graduation

Why did you choose to study at the Department of Primary Education – University of Crete?

"Real change in society can only begin with children... If a child is nurtured with the right values, they can help shape a society that thrives for the good of all."

#### How were your studies?

"The courses provided excellent guidance for anyone wishing to work as a teacher, and the collaboration with professors was truly rewarding. For example, together with one of my professors, we decided to take pedagogical action through experiential activities — as part of her course — to improve accessibility across university spaces!

In general, there are professors here who have so much to offer, truly remarkable individuals. I believe the university opens doors and creates connections you wouldn't easily find elsewhere.

And the School Practicum was an incredible experience... the smiles you receive from the children are the greatest reward. It's the feeling that you're contributing, even a little, to making society better for everyone—through games and activities on various social issues."

Grigoris Kanetakis is 24 years old and studied at the Department of Primary Education, University of Crete, from 2020 to 2024.

He now lives in Athens, where he is actively involved in competitive para swimming.

### **After Graduation**

#### Where are you today?

"A year after graduation, I'm living in Athens and competing professionally in para swimming. I've been swimming all my life for therapeutic reasons — ever since I was diagnosed with spinal muscular atrophy — to help me keep walking. During my teenage years, it became difficult, so I stopped for a while. When I moved to Rethymno, I started swimming again during public pool hours, where I was noticed by a man who collaborated with a team of athletes with disabilities in Athens. Three months later, we went to the national championship — and that's how I got noticed in Athens. I met my coach, who convinced me to stay, and that's how it all began — completely by chance."

#### What are your goals?

"My greatest goal is to contribute, in my own way, to a society for everyone — mainly through children. The Department of Primary Education has definitely helped me move toward that goal. I'm seriously considering becoming a teacher as well.

When I decided to move to Athens last year, I found myself at a crossroads between two careers. In the end, I realized that I didn't want to reach an age where I could no longer perform athletically and look back, seeing a version of myself that wasn't proud. So I told myself, I'll give it everything I've got and see where it takes me.

What I'm pursuing is very demanding — it requires discipline, and of course, personal life is greatly affected by sports life. But the truth is, I can also picture myself in a classroom. The fact that I haven't done it yet doesn't worry me. I definitely want to invest time in my professional growth in education too — it's part of my future plans."

#### To conclude, would you like to share a piece of advice?

"Reach where you cannot. It's a quote by Kazantzakis that carries so much depth when you stop to think about it — what is it that you 'cannot' do? What does 'I can't' really mean? It means reaching the place you believe you can't reach. What you 'can't' do isn't just a technical limit — it's the point where a person begins to confront fear, insecurity, comfort, and the lies they tell themselves. Essentially, it's the moment where denial ends and truth begins. That's how I interpret it."
